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

His repertoire on combining art with Balinese local ingredients established over 24 years including his impressive stint over various culinary presentations at Komaneka.

As the waves crash on the coastline of Komaneka at Keramas Beach, the sea breeze gently touches a masterpiece created by the talented Balinese artist, Pande Ketut Taman, which stands handsomely in the middle of the lower floor of the lobby. The sculpture is two meters high with a circumference of 3.25 meters. The artist named it Karamas.

Saraswati is a Balinese Hindu's holy day to invoke knowledge and wisdom. It is commemorated every six month using Balinese calendar, in which it always falls on Saturday. At the time being, science and knowledge are believed to descend throughout the world.

The procession is started with a morning prayer. For this procession, families will prepare special snacks made of flour and shape in such form to be put into offering. During the ceremony, holly books and stationeries containing teachings or useful for religious teachings, are cleaned and arranged in a place by family to be purified. There is also a belief that during the Saraswati feast, it is prohibited to read and write. So during Saraswati Holy Day, most schools in Bali get their students to join the prayer only without teaching and learning process.

The next day, it is called Banyu Pinaruh that means water of science. It is started with a bath using water with fragrant flowers which is prepared the day before. The process then continued with a prayer with special offering which at the end of the ceremony, all offerings will be shared and eaten by family.

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The whole ceremony is dedicated to the Goddess Saraswati, the god of knowledge and science. Goddess Saraswati is conceived to be a very beautiful goddess with four hands sitting on a swan, while another version said she sits on a lotus. Each of her hands holds different things namely Wina (musical instrument which symbolize science as the great art of culture), Genitri (prayer beads symbolize science as infinite and eternal), Kropak (holy book as the symbol that science is sacred) and Lotus flower (symbolize the sanctity of science); all featured with a very deep meaning.

Saraswati is also name of a river frequently sentenced in Hindu's holy book, Veda. It is said to be the Dewa Nadi (Gods' river) which eternally streams from the mountain and ends in the sea, it never dry. It is also used to describe that science never dies; it goes on through space and time.

The word Karamas means golden light. This is taken from the history of the establishment of Keramas Village, where our hotel was built. The story told through the art itself is our resort home and its surroundings, a beautiful portrayal of Balinese life with nature.

The images carved by the artist are inspired by natural wonders surrounding Komaneka at Keramas Beach. The artwork shows how living beings from three different worlds live side by side in harmony. At the bottom is a group swimming. The middle tells of the life of the Balinese with a variety of cultural expressions on this island, and above this is life in the air, which is described with birds and butterflies. At the top of the artwork is the majestic and sacred volcano Mount Agung.

It took Pande Ketut Taman two years to create this work of art. Now this outstanding piece is part of Komaneka at Keramas Beach. We hope it brings positive vibes from all directions.
